Petro-education: Selling a Texas Land Grant University in Qatar

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This talk examines the role of educational institutions in maintaining the geopolitical structures, inequalities, and class interests of a fossil-fueled world. Drawing on a multi-year ethnography, I trace the global power relations of energy at Texas A&M University, a land-grant university home to a world-renowned petroleum engineering department. I call these relations "petro-education," the flexible mechanisms in universities that reproduce the economic power of the fossil fuel industry. In 2003, Texas A&M established an engineering branch campus in Doha, the capital city of Qatar. At the time, university regents, journalists, and the public raised the question: Why set up an extension of a public land-grant university in the very region deemed the front of the War on Terror? Focusing on how this project was sold to audiences in the lead-up to the 2003 US occupation of Iraq, I argue that petro-education was both realized and instrumentalized in this process. University leadership re-envisioned the mission of a Texas land-grant university 8,000 miles away from its campus as a new frontier geography for U.S. empire.
